Week of Compassion COVID-19 Response -Phase 2: June-November 2020-

Situation Summary:

The COVID-19 global pandemic has created incredible need in the United States, Canada, and around the world. According to WHO statistics More than 3.5 million cases of COVID-19 and 250,000 deaths have now been reported. As of May 7, 2020, only 13 countries report no cases (the majority of those are Pacific Island nations, and some experts question reports from other nations such as Turkmenistan and North Korea). Forecasts from the World Bank reveal that the pandemic is likely to cause the first increase in global poverty rates since 1998 and the Asian Financial Crisis. The World Bank further estimates that the pandemic will likely push an estimated 49 million people into extreme poverty in 2020. Interruptions to livelihoods, food production, and supply chains are of significant concern. Domestically, the pandemic and the measures enacted to slow its spread have resulted in roughly 37 million people filing for unemployment assistance in the United States and Canada in March and April, 2020. While the course of the virus and development of a vaccine and treatment are uncertain, the effects of the pandemic are likely to last throughout the year and possibly into 2021.

Action To Date:

Domestic--Week of Compassion domestic responses have included three primary categories: Congregational Solidarity Grants for Community Assistance, Household Solidarity Grants for Income Loss, and General Ministry Coordination. As of May 7, 2020, Week of Compassion has dispersed grants to 42 congregations totaling \$108,650 and helped connect many more congregations with other available resources.

International--Week of Compassion partners are adapting existing programs as well as developing new responses to meet COVID-19 related needs. As of May 7, Week of Compassion has dispersed \$64,000 in response to 8 requests from various partners in Latin America and Caribbean, the Middle East, Europe, and Asia.

Recommended Phase 2 Action:

In the next phase of response to COVID-19, the staff of Week of Compassion propose three main areas of focus, in addition to the continued collaboration with and referral to other Disciples General Ministries.

- 1. Domestic--Allocate up to \$500,000 for the following two domestic responses: Reactivate the Household Solidarity Grant for Income Loss program to provide support for highly vulnerable households who are experiencing extreme financial hardship and are not eligible for state or federal assistance. The second round of grants will be vetted first by Regional Ministers or the Central Pastors for the racial-ethnic ministries and will have more rigorous requirements for eligibility. - 2. Continue providing grants for congregational ministries, focused on ministries addressing food security. Please see the sample grant application below.
- 3. International--Allocate up to \$1 million for global responses:
 Support appeals from global partners, focusing especially on food security and WASH.
 Please read the summary below for assessing the appeals.

Recommended Action to the Board:

Move that the Board of Stewards authorize the allocation and use up to \$1.3 million from unrestricted funds (roughly \$500,000 from the Compassion in Action fund and up to \$800,000 from unrestricted reserves) for COVID-19 responses in addition to COVID-19 restricted funds, totaling up to \$1.5 million, as outlined in the above proposal and at the discretion of the Executive Director, through November 2020.

COVID19 Global Response

In just a matter of a few short months confirmed cases of COVID19 have crossed over 4 million with associated deaths topping over 300,000. The pandemic has taken its greatest toll on older generations and individuals with weakened immune systems and/or pre-existing health conditions. The impact has created a domino effect that has placed unprecedented strain on some of the world's most vulnerable populations who were already 'living on the edge'. Every year nearly 9 Million people die of hunger and hunger related issues.

The United Nation has predicted that the impacts of COVID19 could see that number double within the next year without a rapid response and significant intervention from the global community.

In response to the global impact of COVID19, Week of Compassion is drawing on its history and expertise of responding to global hunger and health needs by stepping up and continuing its commitment to serving the most vulnerable communities. With a holistic approach to food security and community health, Week of Compassion will focus efforts on heavily impacted areas of the world by working with established partners and planning for long-term interventions.

Recognizing the long-term implications and ripple effect of COVID19 Week of Compassion will receive proposals focused on two main types of interventions responding to COVID19- **Food Insecurity** and **WASH**(Water, Sanitation and Hygiene).

Food Security interventions will demonstrate the following:

- Lives will be saved from 'secondary starvation'
- Proper nutrition will help keep immune systems strong to fight infection(s) such as COVID19
- Local economies will be strengthened and prevent impact from global events now and in the future

WASH interventions will demonstrate the following:

- The spread of COVID19 would be limited by proper sanitation training and education.
- Lives will be saved by means of adequate access to proper sanitation facilities.

Funding proposals to Week of Compassion will be considered in two phases and proposals should include interventions that span 6-12 months in length. Grants will be available in two phases- phase one (June-August 2020) and phase two (September-November 2020).

Grants will **not** support general overhead expenses and will only be considered for interventions that are beyond current organizational programming.

Proposals will be evaluated on a case by case basis and must include clear information about how COVID19 has adversely impacted the target population and/or is of high threat to the target population.

Each proposal will be evaluated on the following criteria:

- Community Need: What is the level of threat/need? How was the threat/need identified? Is the need quantifiable?
- Partners/Collaboration: Who, Where and How will the organization partner with and/or collaborate with others in the field?
- Restrictions in place: Are the local, state and national governments putting restrictions in place that would prevent the partner ability to implement?
- Strategy/Feasibility: Is the proposal strategically outlined/well defined and feasible?
- Impact: Will the intervention have a broad impact?
- Organizational Fit: Does the intervention fit the expertise, capacity and capabilities of the implementing organization?
- Budget: Is there a clear detailed feasible budget included with the proposal?
- Sustainability: Is there a detailed plan in place for sustainability of the intervention?
- Monitoring/Evaluation: How will data be collected and reported during and after the intervention?
- Replicability: Is the intervention easily replicable?
- Organizational Health: Does the organization demonstrate the stability and organizational health necessary to carry out the intervention?
