SECTION 2: Project Summary

Project Goal

Referring back to your original proposal, what is the overall goal of the project? If your plans have changed from the original proposal, please describe.

Empowering Sinabung refugee families through economic empowerment programs of sewing activities, online training sessions in sales and marketing, as well as horticulture trainings sessions in modern agriculture and hydroponics. The Women's Commission conducted a data collection of families who were eligible to receive project benefits. In April 2022, the Communion Churches of Indonesia's Women and Children Bureau visited Kabanjahe to meet with families who will receive program benefits. The meeting resulted in an agreement that they would learn to raise ducks, chickens and raise pigs so that there would be additional economic income for the family.

Primary Activities Implemented

Describe administrative and programmatic activities implemented in your request for funding.

I. Preparation for program Implementation:

1. Coordination Meeting among organizations

A project coordination meeting and memorandum of understanding was signed by the General Secretary of the Communion of Churches in Indonesia (PGI), Reverend Jacklevyn Frits Manuputy, the Batak Karo Protestant Church General Secretary (GBKP), Reverend Yunus Bangun, and the PGI Women and Children Bureau chairperson.

2. Field Visits to Suka Tendal and Perteguhan Villages

A visit to the villages of Suka Tendal and Perteguhan was made to get an overview of the condition of the villagers, and to meet community leaders and village government to share about the project. The people in the village are seasonal farmers and they also do not receive government assistance. Community leaders and the village government welcomed the program for residents. The recipients of the impact of this project in year one included 15 local families who began raising ducks, chickens, and pigs, and another group of young people who learned how to sew. Several workshops were offered in addition to a broader constituency.

3. Coordination meeting with families/project impact recipients

Facilitated by the local church, the women's and children's bureau of CCI had the opportunity to meet directly with the beneficiary families of the program. This meeting aimed to motivate families and to encourage them to take on an opportunity to develop a business. The output of the meeting was that the families were happy with the new opportunity and they chose to learn the process of raising ducks, chickens, and pigs. Prior to this project, families have only focused on vegetable, fruit, and rice farming. Meetings with families resulted in agreements including:

1. Training to raise Ducks, Chickens and Pigs in Suka Tendal Village for 15 families.

2. Sewing Training from Suka Tendal, Perteguhan and Kabanjahe villages for six young people.

4. Duck and Chicken Farmers Training:

The initial step taken was to provide an overview on becoming duck and chicken breeders. Veterinarians and pastors who had previously provided guidance for the congregation to raise ducks presented the overview. During the training they also were taught how to take care of chickens, feed them, and how to make feed.

5. Sewing Training

This project also targets young people who were unable to continue their education to the tertiary level, especially women who are interested in sewing. This training sought to create a group of millennial women who can become professional tailors and provide a source of income for them. The sewing course took place over three months starting from the basics.

6. Online Sale Marketing Training

This project also provided an online training in sales and marketing for all participants to help improve their sources of income through the skills they are learning in their cohorts.

II. Project Implementation:

Empowering Families Affected by Mount Sinabung Eruption

1.1 Duck and Chicken Farmers group:

The Group of duck and chicken breeders included 15 families from Suka Tendal Village. Of the 15 families, 13 families focused on duck farming and 2 focused on chicken breeding. At this early stage, 100 ducklings were given and divided among each family, and the chicken group received 347 chicks. Apart from ducklings and chickens, they were given funds to build a cage and funds to buy three months of feed. Furthermore, the beneficiaries of the project will continue to learn through a program on the Sustainability of Duck and Chickens Farming with the aim of being able to help improve the family's income for the long-term. Additionally, each family has been trained on sales and marketing, and therefore are working to distribute directly to the market and consumers through advertising.

1.2 Sewing Group:

There are 6 (six) people from the sewing group who are skilled at using sewing machines, drawing patterns and sewing fabrics. This group is made up of millennial women, who are sewing clothes, as well as sewing aprons, which were available for purchase at the Fruit and Flower Party Exhibition at the end of July 2022 in Berastagi, Kabanjehe, North Sumatra.

Challenges and Actions Steps Taken to Resolve

1. Coordination Challenges with GBKP:

The challenge faced at the beginning of the program implementation was that Indonesia was still exposed to Covid-19, coordination was carried out virtually which sometimes experienced signal problems from poor weather, so communication faltered and ultimately meetings were less effective at times.

2. Implementation Challenge:

In the Duck Farming Group, a few ducks died due to illness. However, when the group conveyed the problem to the project coordinators, a veterinarian came to determine the cause of death, and to assist families in how to prevent this in the future.

1. Name Shindy Lovovina

Group Sewing



Ms. Shindy Lovina comes from a family with 4 (four) siblings, and her father and mother are farmers in Perteguhan Village. Shindy graduated in 2021, and she had a desire to continue her education to college, but this has not been financially feasible for the family. When there was an offer to take a sewing course, at first, Shindy Lovina didn't really have interest because she did not know how to sew and had never even used a sewing machine. However, Shindy's parents persuaded and motivated her to take this sewing course, so Shindy did.

The first time I stepped on the machine I was nervous and I made mistakes in sewing as well as in drawing the pattern of the fabric to be sewn. But I have remained determined, and I practice a lot by following the teacher's directions. After two months of working with the sewing machine, the process is much smoother, and I am far more comfortable using the machine. I now can draw patterns, cut, and sew clothes. I am very proud to be involved in this program because, finally, I can sew and hopefully in the future this skill will turn into a way to earn my own income.

Group Duck Farming



Juniarti Ginting is a farmer and raises her children in Suka Tendal Village. Their family was affected by the eruption of Mount Sinabung and did not receive assistance from the government, because the government assistance was only provided for families who live within 7 kilometers of the volcano.

I was happy to learn about the project and I immediately accepted the offer. My reason is very simple, I want to increase my family's income. After I told my husband and children about this project they supported me. My husband helped make the cage for our ducks, the children too have been helping, and they helped prepare the duck food. Taking care of ducks is not easy but my husband helps to keep them warm over night by lighting a fire nearby so the ducks do not get cold. The ducks we care for have not laid eggs yet, but we are hopeful still, because all of our ducks are healthy and will be able to produce eggs one day. I am grateful to be involved in this program.

This training is very beneficial for farmer groups because they are given the knowledge to make prebiotic chicken and duck food, so that ducks and chickens are healthy, and it is safe for consumption.

- Program expenditures have changed due to the changes in activities from hydroponics to duck and chicken raising. The costs for training in raising ducks and chickens are higher. Changes in the budget for the project manager's honorarium are planned for 6 (six) months to be paid for only 3 (three) months, as well as the salary of the financial staff to be paid 3 (three) months, so that the funds are sufficient to buy duck and chicken seeds.
- The project received financial support from Global Ministries in the amount of USD 12,500 and the Women and Children Bureau provided the remaining financial support for the project.
- Since preparing the budget, airline tickets have increased significantly, as well as the cost of purchasing ducks, chickens, pigs, and sewing machines.
