SECTION 2: Project Summary

Project Goal

The overall goal of the project has been to "strengthen the already established creative learning center in YWCA Kindergarten located at Jalazone Refugee Camp by improving the psychological well-being of children in the refugee camp through awareness and counseling sessions."

The project was conducted by YWCA of Ramallah, which is an entity under the umbrella of the YWCA of Palestine and registered locally as a non-governmental association affiliated with the World YWCA movement.

YWCA of Ramallah runs a Community Center and a Kindergarten at the Jalazone Refugee Camp located in the North of Ramallah. The center serves more than 9,000 people in the camp and provides direct services to more than 80 children and their families. YWCA of Ramallah also provides empowerment interventions that target women and girls. This is accomplished through awareness and counseling services that improve their psychological well-being and by providing them with needed knowledge and skills to start their own business for economic empowerment.

Primary Activities Implemented

The project enhanced the psychological well-being of children by focusing on both their mental and their emotional health. Psychological well-being is important to their development and gives children the best chance to become well-rounded, healthy adults who have the coping skills in place to deal with day-to-day life. The YWCA has been providing counselling services for children and their parents in Al Jalazone refugee camp. They have also built the capacity of their teachers to enable them to work with children in a manner commensurate with the different psychological needs of children.

It is worth mentioning that the project's activities have been implemented as planned, and all sub-objectives have been achieved as planned in the agreement.

YWCA Ramallah implemented all project activities as follows:

1. Counselling sessions for children

- The YWCA of Ramallah contracted two professional mental health psychologists to conduct counseling sessions for children and their mothers.
- 60 psychological support sessions targeted 80 children (28 girls, 52 boys) divided into three groups. Each group received 20 sessions. The sessions focused on working towards an optimistic future, developing positive coping methods, boosting self-esteem and self-confidence, and other positive states and traits in children. The psychologists used different methods such as play therapy, behavioral therapy, and expressive therapy to support each child to live well after trauma.

The project has a positive impact on the targeted children and developed their personalities and behavior as follows:

- Children talk about themselves in front of others, practice healthy self-expression, build social networks, and develop friendships.
- Children identify their feelings of love, fear, security, and safety.
- Children are playing in harmony and developing physical movements and skills such as running, jumping, and manual movements.
- Children developed their imagination through acting, drawing, coloring, and puppets.

2. Counselling sessions for parents

66 young women benefited from counselling sessions that empowered them to respond in a good way to the stressors their children are experiencing. The first session was held in the presence of 40 mothers, and 26 mothers attended the second session.

3. Capacity building of kindergarten teachers to use the newly acquired teaching methodologies and techniques to promote and enhance the psychological well-being of children.

Ten teachers were targeted. Through three training days, they aimed to raise and discuss important issues from a modern point of view and to advance the process of learning and teaching.

The training sessions built the teachers' capacities and equipped them with modern mechanisms, models, and techniques for engaging kindergarten children. Teachers learned to work with children on the educational learning process and developmental needs and characteristics (cognitive, psychological, social, linguistic, etc.). Teachers and children collaborated to achieve holistic growth and a balanced, adaptive, and productive personality in society.

4. Rehabilitated and improved the outdoor play area by furnishing and equipping it with educational toys and tools.

This intervention enhanced the kindergartners' environment and created a safe space for children to play and be more creative. This intervention benefited 80 children, and improved the outdoor playground as follows:

- The outdoor playground's floor was paved 165 feet (50 meters).
- Supplied 165 feet (50 meters) of artificial grass.
- Supplied three drinking basins with filters and batteries to provide clean water for 80 children daily.
- 5. Activating and developing the activities of the community center.
- A Christmas party was organized to relieve the psychological pressures suffered by the Jalazone camp children. The center presented the play "The Four Seasons," and the children danced with Santa Claus, had their faces painted, and played with Disney characters.
- A Universal Child Day (November)
- Open day for Children (March-Project end)

Challenges and Actions Steps Taken to Resolve

- One challenge has been the political situation. Specifically, the closing down of Jericho City in January affected the failure to end the sessions within the plan. The trainer was from Jericho, and therefore, all sessions were completed after the end of the blockade in the city.
- The comprehensive strike due to the political situation, as it included kindergartens, postponed the implementation of some activities.
- Winter weather conditions. The implementation of some activities was postponed due to the absence of children as well as some of the restoration work.

There was enough time in the activities' plan, so all the delayed activities were carried out comfortably within the year.
