# **Project Goal**

Referring back to your original proposal, what is the overall goal of the project? If your plans have changed from the original proposal, please describe.

This project goal remained the same throughout the year: to enhance sustainable agriculture in the region. In the past year, the priority of this grant was to provide a packaging machine for their processing and production factory so that their herbs can be marketed locally and in neighboring countries.

#### **Primary Activities Implemented**

The ICC-DSPR works in cooperation with the officially recognized Rural Women Society (RWS) which is comprised of 78 members. The RWS runs a kindergarten for 102 children, and supports six teachers, a bus driver, a school assistant, and a coordinator. The RWS initiated the herbal factory project, which is unique in its nature and the only one in the Occupied Palestinian Territories. The herbal factory is equipped with machinery, storage space to receive herbs, wash them, and dry all of the fresh herbs produced. Additionally, eight plastic tunnels or green houses for the planting and production of herbs are in use, which were supported in the year previous by a Week of Compassion Sustainable Development grant.

With the current operation, the community planted 98,000 seedlings for five types of herbs in the last year. With a production cycle of three months, the project can provide a yield of 12 tons of fresh herbs per year. Now, the factory can package herbal tea bags with a new machine, which can prepare and package 20 tea bags per box. The purchase of this new packaging machine was supported by the Week of Compassion Sustainable Development grant.

The ICC has been working with women at the small factory on marketing techniques and online commerce websites. Today, with these skills, the women have designed and are able to accept orders online, here: <a href="https://aqabavillage.com/">https://aqabavillage.com/</a>
