SECTION 2: Project Summary

Project Goal

Referring back to your original proposal, what is the overall goal of the project? If your plans have changed from the original proposal, please describe.

The Girls' Empowerment Club Program of the Evangelical Presbyterian (EP) Church, Ghana aims at creating safe spaces to empower and support girls between the ages of 10-16 years old, to develop confidence and autonomy. The program reaches out to girls at-risk of sexual and gender-based violence, as well as teenage pregnancies in rural areas such as Wegbe Kpalime. The clubs help to empower girls to be able to identify, prevent, and protect themselves against gender-based violence by increasing their knowledge, agency, autonomy, and advocacy capacities to claim and realize their rights.

The program so far has empowered many girls, giving them a voice. For boys, the EP Church, Ghana has used this program to increase their knowledge on the range of gender equality issues, and contributed to making them begin to change their attitudes towards the traditional gender roles that tend to perpetuate Gender Based Violence.

As part of efforts to enhance the academic performance and skills development of Girls Empowerment Club members, this grant has supported programs through diverse means to provide new teaching and learning materials, new skills training opportunities such as jewelry making, pastry making, and selling refreshments. Due to the growth of the Girls Empowerment Club, he EP Church Ghana has built a new library and skills training center in Wegbe Kpalime.

Primary Activities Implemented

Describe administrative and programmatic activities implemented in your request for funding

<u>Skills Training:</u> This project supports club members on how to use new skills to generate an income, and a portion is used to support the activities they participate at the clubs. Recently, skills training courses have been offered on bread-making, pie and pastry making, and jewelry making.

<u>Library Project:</u> This was designed to enhance teaching, learning, and development in Wegbe Kpalime school. Through the new library, EP Ghana will help GEC members and classmates on improving reading skills and access to educational resources to assist in preparing for colleges. The EP Church, Ghana renovated and converted an existing structure to reduce the costs of the project. Based on the recommendation of an architect, most of the carpentry was replaced, including updates to the roof, doors, window frames, and ceiling. Updates to the electrical components were made, and new masonry for the exterior of the building and to create rooms and hallways were placed. The EP Church, Ghana has completed approximate 70% of the construction.

Activities to be completed for the Library and Training Center:

Masonry/Tiling Works

- Plastering the walls and screeding the floors of inner portions of the store and washrooms.
- Tiling of the floors

Completed stairs, covering of gutters, floors in the external wing of the building.

Carpentry Works

- Fixing of remaining doors and door locks
- Fixing of the louvre frames and blades
- Fixing of burglar proof properties
- Creating and fixing of shelves

Electrical Works

- Extending electrical cables to store and washroom areas
- Fixing sockets, switches, and lights
- Fixing of fans or air conditions
- Connecting the electricity to the building (by ECG)
- Fixing of security gadgets

Plumbing Works

- Connecting water to the building
- Fixing of the toilet facilities (WC, pipe, sink, etc)
- Connection of the toilet to the safety tank
- Installation of Poly Water Tank for storage of water

Others

- Painting of the building and other finishing
- Provision of furniture
- Provision of computers, projector, screen, printer, and other accessories
- Internet connectivity
- Provision of library books including reference books

Challenges and Actions Steps Taken to Resolve

The inability of the project to fix sliding glass doors and windows as was planned, due to the rising costs of building and maintenance materials. As an alternative, the project opted to fix wooden doors instead. These are less costly and easily maintained.

Schools are currently closed due to COVID-19, and some girls are selling pastries at this time.

The nearly completed center is being used for some income-generating activities and other activities of the school and the community, with adherence to COVID-19 precautionary procedures.
